In the wake of the Marjory Stoneman Douglas shooting, freshman Rep. Matt Gaetz called for a complete ban on the sale of assault weapons, high-capacity magazines, and bump stocks. As it turns out, however, he lied. On Thursday, Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School junior Aaron Feis was killed when a lone shooter started shooting into a group of students and staff. So-called "bump stocks" were used in the attack, helping to turn a semiautomatic weapon into a fully automatic machine gun. "I think that any sales of these weapons should be banned," Gaetz said. "I'm not saying they are going to stop shootings like we saw today, but I think the fact that these weapons could be bought and used as easily as they are should be troubling to all of us." The comments were first reported by The Hill's Hedy Weinberg. However, despite the fact that Gaetz's call was all about the sales of these weapons, he left out one important fact — they aren't available for purchase. The state of Florida does not allow the sale of bump stocks.

But that's a far cry from calling them "banned." Gaetz used the language of prohibition in his comments, but, in fact, bump stocks aren't prohibited. Rather, they're regulated, which means they're available, but restricted. And it's that restriction that makes them dangerous. Using them, a semi-automatic weapon can be converted to a fully automatic weapon. And that makes it easy for a mass shooter to inflict carnage, even if the shooter has no intention to kill many people. The fact that bump stocks are legal and readily available is precisely why they shouldn't be sold. The NRA is no friend of the Second Amendment. After all, the NRA was behind a bill that would have made it a federal crime for someone to use bump stocks. The NRA backed off on that bill, but it still represents the group's position that you should have to seek a special permit before buying an assault weapon. For someone like Gaetz, whose support for gun control is already razor-thin, making the call for their total ban is political suicide. Under a federal ban, bump stocks would be illegal to use in semiautomatic weapons,
